This is a great time of year to let a few choice plants go to seed as there will hopefully be plenty of time for it to ripen properly The Dunedin Horticultural Society Summer Show is on before the bad weather starts! I have just gathered in the parsnip Sat. Feb. 28th, 2pm-5pm and Sunday March 1st 10am- seed from the two plants I chose for seed production so I am expecting great things from them once it is time to plant them. I saved some seeds from the excellent Carouby snow peas and Susan on 4884054. If you need a schedule Susan will there is a huge Cavolo nero kale plant which has been a great producer with no pests and no sign of going to seed early which I will be saving some seed from too. It does interfere with a tidy garden sometimes but the seeding plants can be moved to a different area to mature if required.

Planting by the Moon Feb/March 2015

Feb 1st to 6th – Cultivate only

7th and 8th - Sow root crops...Turnips, Mr Guyton says! 9th to 14th – Barren period...rest ©

15th or 16th – Spray garlic, rhubarb leaf etc. to deter insects 17th to 21st – Cultivate only-prepare materials for sowing etc 22nd to 2nd March – Sow (spinach, broccoli, onions and cabbage)

March 3rd to 8th - cultivate only.

March 9th and 10th – sow root crops

According to the local planting calendar the time is ideal sowing/planting this month for;

February - <i>in trays</i>	sowing direct (in ground)	
Lettuce	Beetroot	Peas
Silverbeet	Corn Salad	Radish
Spring Onion	Greencrop	Rocket
	Mesclun	Spinach
	Miners lettuce	Turnip

planting seedlings of ;

Broccoli, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Celery, Chicory, Chinese cabbage, Kale, Kohlrabi, Leek, Lettuce, Parsley, Silverbeet and Spring onion.

These dates come from the new Vegetable Planting Chart for Coastal Otago/Southland produced by Jason Ross of Habitate Farm (formerly known as Sutherland Nurseries) which are available from Taste Nature in High St.
