What to plant in May

Jason Ross of Habitate Farm only recommends Broad Beans as suitable for sowing this month on his Vegetable Growing Calendar, misses June altogether and July just has Garlic and Shallots. The magazines have other ideas and, with our changing weather, it may be worth taking a few chances to see if we can get something to grow over winter to fill the 'hungry gap' in spring 🙂

NZ Gardener Diary suggests;

Seeds in trays or some in the ground Broad Beans, Broccoli, onions, cabbage, caulis, onions, peas, silver beet, swedes and turnips.

Punnets or seedlings to plant are:

All brassicas and silver beet.

May Moon Planting:

3rd and 4th - sow roots 10th to 17th - above ground planting (Broad Beans) 18th and 19th - good time to apply liquid fertiliser 25th and 26th – sow more roots

OrganicNZ has top tips for growing Garlic, how to use chicken manure in your garden and a lovely article on a wedding feast made mostly with produce from their own garden. Also another article on Glyphosate (roundup)

Preserved Pumpkin (from NZ Gardener)

Trim the skin from 1kg of pumpkin.

Cut in quarters, remove the seeds and slimy middle (I would have called it connective tissue!) slice into 1cm thick crescents, cutting each of these in half again.

Line the bottom of a wide, heavy-based saucepan with pumpkin pieces.

Pour over 2 cups of sugar, 2 cinnamon sticks and a pinch of salt.

Cover and leave overnight.

By the next morning the pumpkin will have released its' juice. Place pan on a medium heat, bring to the boil and simmer until soft

(1 to 2 hours), don't' let it burn.

Cool, discard cinnamon sticks, remove pieces with slotted spoon and place in clean jars. Pour over syrup and seal.

April garden visit

A small number of our members came along to the NEV Community garden working afternoon and had written a long list of things to do and not to do. Sadly not everyone read what not to do and some eager member pulled out the seeding radish which were meant to be left for seed I think someone noticed in time so that some were left though!!

Seed Saving...tiny advice for a huge topic!

Sometimes we just happen to notice that there is some seed to be harvested and feel pleased with ourselves for catching it... but just as often the rain or wind gets to it and it is too late 😕 A Plan is needed! Choose which plants you want to save seed from and keep a close eye on them. With root crops like carrots and parsnips it is easy to pick the ones you like best when harvesting to replant and grow on for saving seed. Others like beans and peas are also straightforward as long as you have been growing different types far enough apart to ensure no crossbreeding.

Lettuce can be tricky as the flowers and seed heads are small so careful observation to catch them ripening is needed. I like to test to see if the lettuce seed is ready by picking one seedhead off and carefully pulling out the fluffy tops which have the seeds attached to them. If the seed is green and soft then they are not ripe so wait a couple of days and try again. When the seeds come out dry and hard then you can cut off the whole stem and place upside down into a large paper bag for storing until you need them. I like to stand and pick each fluffy top off, nipping the fluff from the seeds with my thumbnail and dropping the seeds into an old envelope or similar. Not all seedheads contain viable seed and this way means you can keep only the good seed .
