August Meeting

This will be a very busy meeting with the seed sharing, preserves tasting/judging and the distribution of the seed potatoes and buckets (gold coin donation) for December competition!! The committee will be down a couple of members who are away on their travels so will appreciate any help from the crowd ©

Seed sharing is an important aspect of local food production and the more information you can provide with your seeds the better for this year's crops. One way to do this is to stay with your seeds to answer any questions as Margaret did last year.... information sheets are also good. The fruit and vegetable preserves tasting will be done with iceblock sticks and forks this year so nothing will interfere with the flavours!! These will be single use but are very recyclable © Members will be asked to indicate their favourite (entries will be numbered) in both categories and hopefully the result will be available on the night. Buckets will be available this year for growing your potato to bring everyone into an 'equal growing space' and allow you to concentrate on the soil and conditions!!

What to plant in August;

Seeds in trays inside or some in the ground depending on your micro climate / cloche

Leek seeds need to go in and be protected this month for planting out Nov/December as they are very slow growing. Also Broccoli, cabbages, capsicum, cauliflower, chicory, celery, chinese cabbage, kale, kohlrabi, lettuces, parsley, silverbeet, spring onion and onions and beetroot inside.

Tomato, chillies, and zucchini if you have a warm place and sometimes pumpkin and corn. Sometimes next month is better.

Plants and seeds in the ground

Broad bean, Carrot, Celeriac, Coriander, Corn salad, Florence fennel, Garlic (almost too late), Mesclun, early Potatoes, Peas, Radish, Rocket, Shallot, Spinach and Turnips.

Time to put in asparagus plants, rhubarb divisions and strawberries.

Moon Planting August 2016

August 6th to 16th –sow and plant above the ground 21st and 22nd– root planting 27th and 28th Root planting September 4th to 13th – sow above ground crops

Please consider potting up your extra seedlings and **label them** for the sales table, or even sowing some extra on purpose!! Carol is away for the next two meetings and regrets not being able to do seedlings as usual.

However, there will be a couple of trays of Merveille de Quatre saison (4 seasons) lettuce, a few herbs and some rhubarb divisions so far[©]
