The Xmas Picnic bus trip to Oamaru began well with perfect weather, prompt arrival of all 34 passengers at the bus station and an excellent friendly driver! A well-timed comfort stop at Palmerston broke the journey and it wasn't long before we were passing the Oamaru botanic gardens to negotiate the entry to the Waitaki Community Gardens.



Once up the hill we spread out quickly admiring the sheltered eating area complete with pizza oven, equipment shed with 3 solar panels on the roof, the large greenhouse and shade house along with the mosaic couch, stylish windmill (built by Steven McCabe's uncle), flourishing vegetable plots, fruit and nut trees, composting area and new permaculture garden on an adjoining plot. Our host Ra then arrived and explained her funded role as organiser and how much she had enjoyed doing the job. Providing vegetable boxes each week for 9 locals had been the biggest challenge but very satisfying and it was just about to start all over again. Ra took us on a tour and answered questions then we took the chance to enjoy our picnic before hopping back on the bus to Riverstone.

A short while later we hopped back off the bus into the blazing heat to be welcomed by Dot who was delighted with our gift of some edible plants. It was difficult to keep up with Dot but I learned that black raspberries have the best flavour for jam and cooking, and that each courgette plant is worth \$200 to the kitchen for the courgettes and a lot of the flowers (stuffed with 3 types of cheese) are needed to feed the masses! Dot finds it difficult to keep up with the demand for parsley (flat and curly) and she has a soft spot for strawberry spinach which she gives a bit of her precious growing space to every year. I missed some of Dot's talk as I went back to rescue Dennis from the fruit trees and the heat was ruining my attention span so I'm sure the other visitors will have more tales to tell....some of them about the castle which was looking magnificent behind the lake and fountain.

After a relaxing hour spent wandering, coffee drinking, ice cream eating and hiding in the shade it was time to get back on the bus and enjoy the air-conditioning and company all the way home:)

Jan leunissen's response to salvestrol talk

An interesting presentation on certain substances from dark (red and purple) coloured fruits and veges: salvestrols, by Donald Saville-Cook. These substances have been demonstrated to kill (some) cancer cells in vitro, so these cancer cells were isolated from human tumours and grown in bottles. Although very interesting and perhaps even promising, there is so far no hard evidence that salvestrols also work in human patients (in vivo). But this topic is worthwhile looking into and we can be happy that we grow plants and fruits that contain these molecules supporting our health. The pharmaceutical industry will only be interested when salvestrols and perhaps more potent customised salvestrols can be produced cheaply and sold for a lot of money. We will see. For now: we would have to eat substantial amounts of such foods (or red wine) or buy the commercially available capsules/pills to have a chance of benefitting the way laboratory experiments have shown.

A critical discussion about this topic developed after the presentation, but rather belongs in a science conference, where personal experiences and gut feeling (which are at the basis of discoveries and progress) have been followed up by in-depth systematic research and later on by large scale drug trials. It does not so much belong in our vege club. What we certainly can take away from the presentation is that we can grow healthy food. Salvestrols occur in higher amounts in plants that are grown under natural conditions and which are exposed to potential diseases than in plants that look all shiny and plastic the way they do on the shelves of supermarkets. Once more this supports growing our produce organically, avoiding spraying with fungicides, pesticides, herbicides etc.
